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
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MESSAGE The Director General of NGO Affairs Bureau

ANANDO AS AN ORGANISATION

Establisment:

Anando established in 1996 non formally and formally on 16 April, 1997 with the registration of the Department of Social welfare and afterward with NGO Affairs Bureau.

Vision of Anando:

Anando envisions a violence free and environmentally sound Bangladesh ensuring basic human rights with special emphasis on empowerment of women, promoting viable entrepreneurship among the disadvantaged groups and nourishing cultural heritage for sustainable peace and solidarity.

Mission of Anando:

Anando strives for culture of development and peace through integrated development approach, which enables individuals and communities to become self-reliant.

Goal of Anando:

The goal of the organization is poverty reduction and employment generation for the poor and marginalized families and thereby create a society based on justice, equity and self-respect through involvement of the poor and disadvantaged group of people in various development activities and through creation of awareness about various problems and issues that concern the individuals, the community and the country at large.

Background:

Father Klaus Beurle with the association of some professionals like university teachers, development practitioners and social workers founded Anando to uphold the progress of poor people especially the disadvantaged and youth through promotion of culture, peace and development. Father Klaus Beurle was one of the most active and intelligent workers in the NGO movement in Bangladesh, and in addition to Anando, he founded several other organisations as well. Anando was initiated in 1996 non formally and formally on 16 April, 1997 with the registration of the Department of Social Service and afterward registered with NGO Affairs Bureau & Microcredit Regulatory Authority.

Anando - Promotion of Culture and Youth Resource Development is a non-profit, non-political and voluntary development organisation (NGO). Anando is a Bengali word which means 'Joy'. Anando, its entire connotation, believes in the sprit of joy – that involves not only an individual but a greater joy of the community. Anando believes in harmonious culture that upholds the amity of the people of various religious groups existsing here from time immemorial. Anando also believes in peace that ensures the presence of justice as well as development that treats all people equally and protects the right of the poor, disadvantaged and minority people of the society.



Introduction:

Anando started its journey in 1996 by a group of teachers, journalists, development practitioners and social workers in order to uphold the socio economic status of poor people especially the disadvantaged rural people and youth through promotion of culture, peace and development including providing emergency response.

Anando is a Bangla word which means 'Joy' (delighted and joyfulness). Anando, with its entire connotation, believes in the spirit of joy that involves not only an individual's happiness but also the happiness of the wider community based on an environment of a harmonious culture upholding the amity of people of diverse religious groups. Anando also believes in peaceful coexistence of people that ensures justice and development, and treats all people equally, protects the rights of the poor and minority people of the society.

Anando believes in bottom-up, non-directive, integrated and participatory development approaches and acts as a catalyst with its stakeholders who are financially disadvantaged due to lack of opportunities but have potentialities to strive hard for change and to stand on their own. As of now Anando has implemented more than 100 projects with the financial support of different donors.

Anando's projects are managed through three major programme approaches, namely Micro finance, Development and Humanitarian. The numerous projects combine two to three of these approaches.


Anando reached out to 246,344 beneficiaries with its development as well as emergency response activities in 07 districts. Currently Anando has 277 staff of which 50% are female and it has 21 offices of which 16 are its own establishment in different locations in Bangladesh to implement the programs.



Employment & Income Generation through Micro Finance

Employment and Income Generation Programme (EIG), a major programme of Anando is implemented through integrated family development approach. This programme has been undertaken by Anando to make the poor people economically self-reliant and help them to attain a respectable social standard. The programme includes training for beneficiaries on simple accounting and basic financial management, identification and management of income generating projects, and mobilizing group savings to Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) for expanded income generation of the target people. EIG seeks to income and ensure women's rights in their family and increase community.







Children Education Program (Non-Formal Education):

Anando has implemented children education program in Cox's Bazar, Tangail, and Khagrachari of Chittagong Hill Tracts (CHT) in close collaboration with local community people. The ultimate purpose of the Children Learning Center (CLC) is to prepare the children to get admission into local Government Primary School. A total of 15,500 students have graduated from CLCs of Anando and in 2021, 629 students have graduated from 26 Children Learning Centers of Anando who have finally been enrolled in local Government Primary Schools for further study.



Homestead Agriculture and Food Production Program:

Small space but more production, with this motto Anando is promoting homestead gardening to bring the nutritional balance in the rural communities. Homestead vegetable gardening is a vital component of traditional farming which contributes a significant amount of food production in terms of quality and diversity of the family diet providing vitamin-A, and combating micro nutrient deficiency. Homestead farming includes a wide variety of fruits and bings in vegetables production round the year and integrated animal husbandry into other homestead food production activities.



Social Cohesion and Peace Building

After the signing of the Peace Treaty, Anando has carried out several activities under the Social Cohesion and Peace Building Project, especially in Khagrachari; prior to this, relationship among the various tribal races and the Bengali people were poor. The races had no sense of unity and would never gather together for any events. Anando has allowed them all to engage themselves in activities such as processions, awareness sessions, rallies and discussion sessions. Now everyone spend time with people from other races and develop friendly relationships; hostility on longer exists among them.

After this special activities the locals have begun greeting one another and celebrating festivals together. Trade between the tribes and the Bengaleies has increased significantly.

In short, the local people have finally begun living in peace. At the same time Anando is implementing the same project for other working areas of Anando especially for Cox's Bazar area.



Family Development Plans (FDP) Approach

Anando believes in Family Development Plan (FDP) approach rather than group development approach. FDP is the first and basic step to start the community based development activities with the community people. The development of FDPs follow several steps, namely 1) the group members will identify their socio economic conditions and opportunities; 2) they will be oriented about the dream of their family development; they will discuss among their family members about their dream and how to achieve it; 4) they will draw a picture in two parts; in the left side they draw their present situation and at the right side their vision for the future. At step 5), they will prepare a three-year FDP to accomplish the vision. This is a participatory development approach, in which beneficiaries will prepare their development plan, while the Anando will facilitate the conceptualization, analysis and planning for the future. In order to accomplish the three-year FDP, the project participants will be supported by the project through necessary training and start-up supports





Relief and Rehabilitation Program and emergency response program:

Relief and Rehabilitation

We are always active in conducting relief and rehabilitation program of any disaster program and emergency response. In 2017, in Jamalpur district Anando provided emergency relief and post flood support to 500 households and also provided post flood supports such as start-up support, training support on winter crop distribution, distribution of seedling and sapling and raising and repairing homes damaged by flood by which the flood affected peoples were able to come bring back to the normal life.



COVID-19 Response

Aanando implemented a COVID-19 Response project in Tangail and Cox's Bazar. Major activities included 1. establishment of COVID-19 Information Centres to create awareness on covid-19, these cunting conducted awareness raising campaign on COVID19 through Local TV Channel, provided Food support to 4400 Marginalized Community People in collaboration with local government and church. The food packages per family included Rice, Pulse, Oil, Salt, Potato, Children Nutritious food. More than 1500 Children (6-10 age) received learning and education materials from the project.



Rohingya Response

In Rohingya Refugee camps, a total of 3000 refugee families received life-saving assistance like food stuff to meet emergency needs, 2250 refugee families received hygiene kits support in order to meet their basic needs and 15000 refugee families received complete WASH supports from Anando.



Water and Sanitation Program

Anando has been implementing Water and Sanitation Program since the Rohingya influx occurred i.e. since 2018 in all Teknaf camps and its adjacent neighborhood communities to provide the following services:

- Construction of Latrine (New/Rehab/ Replacement), Bathing Cubicles (New/Rehab /Replacement), Hand Washing Devices. % Waste Collection Points
- Operation and Maintenance of Latrines, Handwashing Station, **Bathing Cubicles**
- Desludging of Latrines & Improvement/Upgradation of Latrines (Lock/Door/Roof/etc, Bathing Cubicles (Lock/-Door/ Roof /etc.)
- Decommission of Latrines and Bathing Cubicles
- Construction of Tap Stands, Maintenance and Operation of Water Supply Scheme, Water Quality Tests, Chlorination of Water Storage
- Conduct Hygiene Promotion Sessions
- Waste Management Demonstration Session beside Communal Bin
- Distribution of waste buckets at the household level
- Distribution of MHM kits







Vocational Training Centre - VTC

Anando has a very well-constructed building under this program. This is a semi-pucca building, 1450 square meter in size and has a veranda and six rooms for conducting classes and project administration. It also has 422 square meter open workshop space for practical work. The centre provides training of different trades. One year course (9 months in campus and 3 months internship). Training on trades include: Electrical Trade, Mechanical Trade, Electronics Trade, Welding Trade, and Tailoring – Two Trade and Computer – Basic Trade



Boys' Hostel: There is a 924 square meter two-storied fully pucca dormitory that provides accommodation for 30 boys (students) including dining hall, bathrooms, toilets and two quest rooms for visitors.



Girls' Hostel: Anando constructed a 3 storied girls' hostel in 2015 with the kind support of Die Licht Brucke, Germany accommodating 20 girls including dining-cum-reading room, one office room of the hostel super along with her residence on the roof-top.





Climate Change and Adaptation Program

Bangladesh, having one of the highest urbanization rates of Asia and being at the same time at high risk against impacts of climate change, is a country with urgent need of intervention. Urban population is expected to double until 2050, with then 112 million people living in cities.

To protect inhabitants in urban areas against the effects of climate change, Anando is implementing "Enhancing Resilience of Urban Poor" project in slum areas in Sathkhira district in collaboration with GIZ and Satkhira Municipality. The project focuses on different aspects and features an integrated approach. The aim is reduce the effects of heat islands, greening measures are implemented on, around and next to the houses. The upgrading of an area into a public green space, a rainwater harvesting facility being included, serves as an educational opportunity for urban greening and water management options at household and public space level and at the same time as space for information on climate change. A solar powered "Climate Change Digital Learning Hub" will therefore be constructed next to the public open green space. This results in the community having knowledge of municipal services, climate adaptation and mitigation measures and a collective awareness on impact reduction and early warning systems



Restoration of denuded hills and climate resilient Bio-diversity

In order to Restoration of denuded hills and climate resilient Bio-diversity, Anando planted a total of 2, 72,672 seedlings/saplings of 26 native tree species in their barren hills with the involvement of the 235 forest dwellers in the Dighinala upazila under Khagrachari district and in addition total 27,250 bamboo seedlings/cuttings have also planted both at the hill base and stream bank. Beside 12 types of climate-smart technologies have established to promote climate resilient agriculture. At the same time, Champa, Garjan Chapalish - three critically endangered native tree species were restored through the plantation. Hence the barren hills are now flourishing with new perennial plantations covering the fallow spaces of the hills and valleys covering bio-resources at every remote corner of the 235 hills. The timber and perennial fruits trees are now growing with enormous branches and subject to pruning reducing fuel consumption locally.

As a result, the forest dependency of CHT people is reduced by 60-70%, and the average annual income of CHT people is increased by BDT 25,000 - 30,000 and also all the denuded hills are become greening and it brought a positive impact to the climate change.







PROGRAM INNOVATION & BEST PRACTICE

Nutrition Gardens and Sustainable Integrated Farming System (SIFS):

All families who attended the nutrition camps are also trained on creating their own homestead nutrition gardens. This helps the family to grow and cook diverse food for the malnourished children and other family members. Interested farmers are given hands on training on integrated farming. These farmers became resource/demonstration farmers under the Farmer Field School concept to train other interested farmers in replicating the farm design. SIFS follows the principles of 1) improving cropping sequence 2) multi-storey arrangement and 3) integrating crop, tree, livestock, poultry, aquatic system and bio digestor. The objective of nutrition sensitive agriculture is to help families improve their dietary diversity and reduce market dependence.



Strengthening Institutions:

It is the foundation for community mobilization and behaviour change. The project has engaged itself with existing community-based institutions such as Self-Help Groups, Farmer groups and Committees mandated under the Government programs, e.g. the Village Health, Nutrition and Sanitation Committees. These groups/committees have been empowered and strengthened to provide leadership, connect the villages with the relevant government departments and plan/monitor the nutrition and WASH interventions.



Family Development Plan:

Anando is focused on the Family Development Plan (FDP) rather than group development plan because we believe that The Family Development Plan (FDP) is the first and basic step to start the development activities with the vulnerable communities. The development of FDPs follows several steps, namely 1) the group members will identify their socioeconomic conditions and opportunities; 2) they will be oriented about the dream of their family development; 3) they will discuss among their family members about their dream and how to achieve it; 4) they will draw a picture in two parts; in the left side they draw their present situation and at the right side their vision for the future. At step 5), they will prepare a three-year FDP to accomplish the vision. This is a participatory development approach, in which community people will prepare their development plan, while the Anando will facilitate the conceptualization, analysis and planning for the future. Anando has been implemented number of projects by applying this approach in different communities in order to bring the community ownership and their sustainable development.



Building Social Cohesion:

Anando has been working to bring a peace and social cohesion between host communities and Rohinhya Refugees and also between Banglali communities and CHT peoples, through undertaking different community based activities with the support of donors and local communities. Anando young women and men are powerful believes peacebuilders, actively seeking creative and innovative ways to resolve conflict, prevent violence and promote peace. In Bangladesh, young people are driving social cohesion by advocating for gender equality, the rights of religious and ethnic minorities, non-discrimination, and public policy based on non-partisan interests. For building the social cohesion, Anando established peace building support centre in the communities, conduct Peace Education at the Educational institutions, developed and Educated Family Peace Councilor (FPC) to link with different district networks to get further supports, organize Annual (solidarity) gathering and Capacity Building on Leadership Development and Advocacy




